Sailing with GPS

Quite a few of our members are sailors, and many who read the LOG are open to giving it a try. Toward that end, we are offering a 2-hour, on-line *Sail Trim/Introduction to Sailing Seminar* in April. Meanwhile, let's talk about how sailors can use GPS to ease their task.

Most people who use GPS are looking to get somewhere. They will tend to select their destination and follow the GPS to get there. If there are obstructions along that path, they will add intermediate waypoints and sequentially navigate each one until they reach their desired spot.

Sailors often cannot go directly to a selected waypoint, and sometimes are better selecting a slightly different course to get there faster. That means they will not be following the prescribed, pre-qualified safe path presented on the chartplotter screen. Instead, they will be intentionally sailing off that path.

When the destination is to windward, the boat won't go that way. Generally, you can sail to within 45° of the true wind direction, but not closer. You reach your destination by tacking back and forth along a zig-zag path until you reach your mark (which you have dutifully selected as your waypoint).

Now, it is incumbent upon you to pre-qualify a whole region to be safe, not just a path. How do we stay within that region? Simple, use the "Off Course" alarm on your GPS. Set the lateral limits from your course center line (or "rhumb line" as it is known) to be within any hazards and keep going until you hear the alarm, then tack.

Sailing at 45° to the wind may be a shorter path, but is it the fastest way to get there? It turns out that sailing slightly off that angle, say 50° from the wind might be faster. How can you tell? Well, your GPS comes equipped with a feature called VMG (that stands for "Velocity Made Good"). That tells you just how rapidly you are closing on your mark even though you are not going straight at it. By monitoring VMG and adjusting your course until VMG reaches a maximum value means you are getting there faster, even though you are sailing farther away from the mark. You can also use VMG to adjust your sails. Just tune to the maximum value for your new heading.

Going downwind? If your mark is truly downwind, you may be better off sailing slightly to one side or another. The boat's performance generally will be better that way. Again, use your VMG and adjust for the maximum.

In both cases, upwind and downwind, you will need to tack to finally reach your mark. But you'll be there faster and closer than you would be by taking the course nearest to the mark. We'll talk about when you should tack in a future article or seminar.

Meanwhile, Safe Boating to all!



What is a Vessel Safety Check? (VSC)

Whether you are a first time vessel owner, or an experienced operator it is always good to have a safety check inspection scheduled on your vessel. It's like your boat's annual physical, and it is done by certified individuals who happen to be fellow boaters with lots of knowledge that can help you.

A Vessel Safety Check (VSC) is a courtesy examination of the boat (no cost!) to verify the presence and condition of certain safety equipment required by state and federal regulations.

The volunteer Vessel Examiner is a trained specialist, and a member of either the United States Power Squadrons or the US Coast Guard Auxiliary. These volunteers will also make certain recommendations and discuss certain safety issues with the boater.

The examiner will supply the boater with a copy of the evaluation so that they may follow some of the suggestions given. Vessels that pass will be able to display a VSC decal. This does not exempt a boater from law enforcement boarding, but it signals the boat's compliance usually making an official boarding unnecessary.

There is no charge for these safety checks, and no consequences if you don't pass. The goal is simply to help make boating as safe as possible for the owner, owner's family and owner's friends, through education. These safety checks are for personal pleasure craft only.

New ECOS Guidance from the Coast Guard

On April 1, 2021 a new federal law goes into effect that requires the operator of a boat with an installed Engine Cut-Off Switch (ECOS) to use the ECOS link. The link is usually a coiled bungee cord lanyard clipped onto the operator's person, Personal Floatation Device (PFD) or clothing and the other end attached to the cut-off switch, but there are plenty of variations on the market, including electronic wireless devices. The law applies on all "Navigable Waters of the US".

When an operator is wearing a link while underway, the engine will cut-off if the operator is separated from the operating area, an occurrence that can happen if the operator is ejected from the vessel or falls within the vessel. The shutdown of the engine is essential for safety reasons. If the operator is ejected from the vessel, the shutdown may prevent the operator from impacting the vessel's spinning propeller, and may aid the operator in safely returning to the drifting vessel.

The law applies to "Covered Recreational vessels" which means any motorized boat with 3 or more horsepower that is less than 26 feet in length and takes effect on April 1, 2021. If the boats' primary helm is inside an enclosed cabin it is not required to have an Engine Cut-Off Switch.

Operator Requirement: An individual operating a covered recreational vessel shall use an engine cut-off switch link while operating on plane or above displacement speed.

An earlier law, passed by congress in 2018, required manufacturers to install an Emergency Engine Cut-Off Switch (ECOS). The law passed on December 4th 2018, and went into effect 1 year later. Even though it is now a law, most U.S. boat manufacturers have voluntarily installed an ECOS on their boats for decades.

If your boat doesn't have an Engine Cut-Off Switch, you are not required to install one, unless the boat was built on or after 1 JAN 2020. The installation requirement applies to manufacturers, distributors and dealers of "covered recreational vessels" after 1 JAN 2020. For those boats, an Engine Cut-Off Switch must be installed and the owner is required to maintain it and use it.

Program Offers A Lifeline To Fishermen, And A Home For Unwanted Oysters

Standing on a cold, wet beach, Bruce Silverbrand rummages through a metal basket of oysters. He picks out a huge one — almost as big as a mitten, with a knobbed and lumpy shell. It's what people in the shellfish industry call a "big ugly," though Silverbrand abhors the term.

"I would never call an oyster ugly — these are my babies," he says. He considers the monster in his hand for a moment, turning it over for a good look. "This is not a bad looking oyster, really, for a big oyster."

Silverbrand runs the Buttermilk Bay Oyster Company in Bourne. He's been a shellfisherman his whole adult life — about 30 years — but he started growing oysters just a few years ago. This was the year they were going to turn the corner, he says. Then came COVID-19.

"The beginning of this year, we sold 28,000 oysters in a matter of 10 weeks," he says. We were really rolling. And then all of a sudden the COVID comes and, you know — it stops everything."

BOSTON— Coast Guard crews successfully medevaced a 45-year-old fisherman from the 80-foot fishing vessel, Mariner, approximately 35 miles east of Nantucket, Massachusetts, Sunday.

At 12:50 p.m., watchstanders at the Coast Guard Sector Southeastern New England Command Center were notified by the vessel captain who was concerned about a crewmember experiencing chest pains.

The Coast Guard duty flight surgeon was consulted and recommended a medevac based on the concern that the fisherman's condition could worsen if left untreated.

A Coast Guard Air Station Cape Cod MH-60 Jayhawk helicopter aircrew transported the man back to shore where Emergency Medical Services took him to Cape Cod Hospital.

The weather at the time of the medevac was reportedly four-foot seas and 20 mph winds.



BOSTON — The Coast Guard medevaced an injured fisherman 60 miles south of Nantucket, Massachusetts, Sunday.

At approximately 3:30 a.m., Coast Guard District One watchstanders received notification from a crewmember of the commercial fishing vessel Furious, home-ported in Stonington, Connecticut, reporting a 41-year-old crewmember had received a hand injury and requested assistance.

A Coast Guard Air Station Cape Cod MH-60 Jayhawk helicopter crew launched and safely hoisted the fisherman at approximately 7 a.m.

The fisherman was transported to Massachusetts General Hospital for care.

Weather on scene was 15 mph winds with five-foot seas.




