AMERICA'S BOATING COURSE

America's Boating Course (ABC) is the United States Power Squadron's primary effort toward public instruction in the fundamentals of boating. The ABC course is recognized as one of the very best in introducing people to boating.

At the national level, the ABC course meets NASBLA certification requirements. At the state level, the ABC course meets MA requirements for boat operation by 12-15 year old boaters.

This course covers the basics of operating a boat safely, including rules of the road, aids to navigation, required equipment, and boat handling techniques.

Each class is an interactive, virtual presentation on 4 weekday evenings followed by a "drive in" in person, proctored exam given the Sunday following the last class.

On Water Boat Handling

Bob Sweet

With a large number of people entering the world of boating comes the realization that handling a boat is a bit unique. It is not the same as driving a car. The demand for training is growing rapidly. At the same time, we are still exercising social distancing.

Buzzards Bay Sail & Power Squadron has offered on water training for years. We were one of the first to do so. We even were a beta tester for the original USPS program. In 2007, USPS was awarded a Coast Guard grant contract to develop an on-water program based around our classroom seminar. Up until that time, USPS had no on-water program due to lack of proper insurance. With the able assistance of our own P/C Frank Lingard, USPS was able to acquire insurance and the program began.

BBSPS did not offer on water training in 2020 for obvious reasons. However, this year we are offering sessions for two people at a time. Dick Moore is the captain and is using his 20-foot Boston Whaler for the training.

Our unique approach is based on pre-training via our seminar which I present. During the first session which is now live and on-line, participants learn how a boat behaves and how to get it to do what they want it to do. When they get on the water, they have the advantage of knowing what to expect when executing a maneuver.

This gives them a head-start, building a positive level of experience which speeds skill-building. This was born out in our beta tests when relatively new boaters out-performed experienced boaters on the water. We concluded that the "experienced" boaters had learned their techniques by trial and error and had to "unlearn" some bad habits. Meanwhile, the "newbies" started right with some proper training and did quite a bit better.

After 3-4 hours on the water, the participants attend a second seminar session to review what they learned and move on to more advanced issues such as dealing with winds and currents in close quarters, some docking and handling tips, and dealing with building seas in open water. We are one of the few squadrons offering this program.

We also will go aboard a member's boat to help them with their handling issues as part of a complementary program now offered by USPS. Contact me or Dick Moore for more details.

Understanding Propellers

When power boats move forward they are being driven through the water by the action of their propellers. The propeller(s) act like a pump drawing in water from ahead and pushing it out behind. This moving stream of water creates an opposite forward thrust at the propeller which is transmitted to the boat and moves it forward. (Newton's third law of motion) Propellers can be right hand, which rotate clockwise in forward gear when viewed from behind the boat or left hand, which rotate in a counter clockwise direction.

The blades of a propeller are not simply flat but are both curved and angled, like other curved foils on a boat such as a sail. When the blades move through the water there is a low pressure area created on the front facing side of the blades while a high pressure area is created on the aft facing side. This creates lift. The lift creates a force which is roughly perpendicular to the propeller blade and can be divided into two components. Thrust is a force exerted in the direction of motion or toward the bow when the boat is in forward gear. Torque is a rotational component applied in a direction opposite to the propeller motion. The thrust drives the boat ahead while the torque will make the boat rotate around its longitudinal axis. For a smaller boat with a larger engine and a right hand propeller this will tend to make the port side of the boat dip under acceleration.

Turning propellers not only create forward or reverse thrust but also produce forces that tend to push them to one side or the other, depending on their direction of rotation. For an inboard boat with a propeller shaft set through the hull at an angle to the horizontal, the water flowing through the propeller meets the blades at different angles depending on whether they are on the downward or upward part of their circle. For a forward turning right hand propeller the effective blade pitch (angle) is increased on the descending blades, which are on the starboard side, and decreased on the ascending blades on the port side. This creates a stronger thrust on the starboard side which tends to make the stern move slightly to starboard rotating the bow slightly to port when the boat is moving ahead. When the boat is operated in reverse, the effect is opposite and the stern will move to port. For a left hand rotating propeller these effects are the same but in opposite directions.

In outboard or stern drive boats, because their propellers are nearer the water surface and encounter aerated water, another effect, the paddle wheel, or "propwalk" may come into play. A propeller blade sweeping across the top of its arc turning through less dense water will not pull as hard in a sideways direction as the fully submerged blade sweeping across the bottom of the propeller arc. This will cause a right hand propeller, rotating clockwise, to "walk" to starboard causing the stern to move slightly in that direction, or turn the boat to port, when it is in forward gear. In reverse gear the effect is in the opposite direction and the stern will "walk" to port. On an outboard motor there is a small trim tab mounted below the cavitation plate which may be adjusted to counteract the side thrust in forward gear. For a left hand rotating propeller these effects are in the opposite directions.

For inboard or outboard / stern drive boats the effects are the same, although they have slightly different causes. In single engine power boats we must learn to use these forces to our advantage to create the type of movement in the boat we want.

Chatham's Shifting Sands & MONOMOY ISLAND ACCESS

Cape Cod has a great number of shoals and shifting sands that alter channels and navigable waters after passing storms. You need to be on top of your navigation skills, learn to use your instruments, use local knowledge, and keep a sharp lookout to avoid running aground. The following article is an example why.



Otherwise, our waters are looking great for this summer. The Harbormaster's Office staff have done a great job getting the many miles of our local in-shore waters buoyed up with the Red & Green buoys as well as a multitude of center channel markers. Simple red/orange balls are being used to mark the shallowest channels and where you see these the channel is either tidal or requires extreme caution when transiting at low water.

The turn to the east from Stage Harbor is further to the SW than in years past so head out the harbor more before turning east. The first set of markers are round balls - these are placed in the shallowest area. Remember - this passage will be tidal and we suggest 2 hours either side of high to be safe (or mid-tide and higher in a smaller boat). The Stage Harbor entrance channel into Nantucket Sound is in decent shape - remember some additional dredging is scheduled for later this spring/early summer. The Log

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As you cross to the East of Morris Island there are a couple of concerns. 1) At high tide there is a lot of feedback from the stone revetment - this area can become very sloppy with wave energy coming broadside to your boat from both the port and starboard. 2) Watch out for floating debris - trees and limbs are actively eroding from the embankment and can pose a hazard.

The "Southway" taking you east of Outermost Harbor into the Atlantic is also marked and is considered to be the safest of the inlets to take you out of Chatham Harbor. While the "North Cut" has been marked it has some shallower bars so use caution. ONLY use these inlets when sea conditions and the forecast allow for safe crossing. Be mindful that all it takes is a wind shift or a tide shift and in the matter of 30 min what was once a calm inlet can become impassable and very dangerous. The image below is from this spring and shows the approximate shoaling as one crosses in front of Outermost Harbor to enter the Southway to run SE or continue running North into Chatham Harbor. There is a section of shallow shoals in the middle that need to be closely monitored. Crossing this section the center buoys are once again a set of 5-6 small red/orange buoys.



Coast Guard rescues 5 fishermen from burning vessel 85 miles east of Cape Cod



BOSTON — The Coast Guard rescued five mariners from a vessel fire 85 miles east of Cape Cod, Massachusetts, Friday.

At approximately 5 p.m. Coast Guard First District watchstanders received an EPIRB notification from the 100-foot trawler Nobska.

Coast Guard Air Station Cape Cod crews were launched and when they arrived on scene the bow and wheelhouse of the vessel were engulfed in flames and all five Nobska crew members were on the stern. The air crew directed them into the water where they were safely hoisted and transported back to shore. No injuries were reported.A Coast Guard Air Station Cape Cod, Massachusetts, MH-60 Jayhawk helicopter crew, and HC-144 Hercules crew responded. Weather on scene was 25 mph winds with six-foot seas.

BOSTON — The Coast Guard warns of cold water hazards following five fatalities across the First Coast Guard District within the month of May.

The Northeast had 30 recreational boating fatalities in 2019, and 50 in 2020. There have been five fatalities within the first two weeks of May alone.

While the weather may be heating up, the water temperatures are dangerously low in the 50s and don't typically get warmer until mid-summer around July and August. Water this cold can physically incapacitate someone in less than 10 minutes, leaving them physically helpless in the water unable to use their arms, legs, feet, and hands.

Water temperatures below 70 degrees will quickly lower body temperature resulting in hypothermia, resulting in a loss of dexterity, motor control, mental confusion, and unconsciousness.

It takes as little as 30 minutes for an adult of average size to lose dexterity in waters of 60 to 70 degrees, and as little as two hours to become unconscious. Without a life jacket, this will likely result in drowning.

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Boaters, kayakers, surfers, and stand-up paddlers should follow these simple precautions to increase your survivability prior to getting out on the water:

- Dress appropriately for the water temperature, not the air temperature by wearing wet suits, dry suits, immersion suits, survival suits, and exposure coveralls.
- Always wear a life jacket, even if not required by law.
- Carry an Emergency Position Indicating Radio Beacon (EPIRB), personal locator beacon (PLB), VHF Radio, or cell phone.
- File a float plan with someone you trust. The plan should include details about the trip, boat, passengers, towing or trailer vehicle, communication equipment, and emergency contacts.
- Know before you go! Check the weather and water temperature before going out on the water. Download the United States Coast Guard app. This app offers resources to file a float plan, request emergency assistance and more.

Cold water can kill! If you find yourself in a compromising position while out on the water, make sure to follow these guidelines until help arrives.

- 1. Stay Calm.
- 2. Minimize time in the water. Get out as soon as possible in a safe manner.
- 3. Evaluate your options. If you can swim to safety, stay calm and do so. If you are unable to swim to safety, conserve energy and await rescue.
- 4. If you cannot get to safety, assume the Heat Escape Lessening Position (H.E.L.P) to protect critical body areas, slowing down the loss of heat. If possible, and with others, form a huddle in the water to conserve body heat.




