## Where did my Charts go?

Are you looking for a chart of Buzzards Bay, or Nantucket Sound, Cape Cod, or the Cape Cod Canal? They are gone! That's true for the equivalent raster electronic charts as well. What happened to them?

NOAA has declared its intent to "sunset" all paper and raster charts by 2025. They're well along their way. Why? It's a matter of budget. For many years, NOAA has been providing three basic chart products: paper charts, their raster electronic equivalents (called RNC), and vector electronic charts (called ENC). They maintain a common database which is updated continuously. To produce an ENC chart an electronic datafile is provided to the user. On a chartplotter, a chart appears on the screen. To produce a paper chart or RNC, cartographers take the data and decide how it is to be placed on the chart. In other words, NOAA has been maintaining a second set of charts by hand. They don't want to do that anymore – budgets and all that!

Our charts came up on the deletion cycle. So, our paper and raster charts are gone. For a while you may be able to get some pre-deletion. You also can find the old charts online under "Historical Charts" as PDF files should you want to have them printed. However, they no longer will be updated.

I am a firm believer in using printed charts along side of your chartplotter. Why? They provide the big picture. For example, at a reasonable level of zoom on your chartplotter, you may only be able to see a few miles to the edge of your screen. The printed chart covers a greater area. It's also there if the chartplotter goes bonkers. And, you can write on a paper chart.

Can I still get printed charts? The answer is a qualified "yes." Companies like Maptech will still produce their chartbooks using whatever they can get. OceanGrafix will still print charts using the digital data files, but they are a bit different.

How are vector charts different from raster? The raster chart is essentially a "picture" of its paper cousin. It looks exactly like the original. The vector chart is basically a "tracing" of the paper chart. The shorelines are constructed of little, short line-segments. The soundings are just data at a particular location. The chart is drawn on your chartplotter using the digital data provided. That data is what is updated in the NOAA computer.

So, what is on the NOAA computer? When the vector charts were originally created, they traced the existing paper charts and converted them into digital data. However, they were not required to trace everything. For example, land features were largely ignored. That saved space in the digital files. Who needed that anyway? Well, for recreational boaters who use land as a reference, it's pretty handy to have. In any event, the scale and detail of the digital data files mirror the paper charts from which they came. So, if there was a detailed paper chart for an area like Woods Hole, the digital data file is equivalently detailed. However, in areas for which there were only small scale (large area, less detail) charts, the digital vector charts are similarly without detail.

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So, if you look at a vector chart next to a raster one, they appear quite different. The soundings are there, as are the shorelines. However, what you see on your screen is what the programmer of your chartplotter thought you ought to see. There may be more data there, but you may need to scroll over to something and click to see it. For example, information about navigation aids may or may not show up on your screen without extra effort on your part. When creating a paper chart, the cartographer had to work to make sure everything you needed was on the chart where it needed to be and perfectly understandable.

So, back to paper charts in the ENC era. NOAA has created a program to enable you to create a PDF of any chart of your choosing. It is called NCC (NOAA Custom Chart). Google "NCC" and you can find it. With NCC you can select the size of the paper, its orientation and placement and it will produce a file. You can take that file to a printer. Here's the catch. The digital files don't have a lot of what you may have become accustomed to seeing. And, the labels for navigation aids may not show up where you expect them. In other words, NCC is a work in progress. However, that has not stopped NOAA from cancelling the paper charts. Also, with this change, chart numbers as we know them are gone. Other chart products that NO-AA created especially for recreational boaters are also gone. The "strip charts" along the Intracoastal Waterway which provided a linear view of the waterway are gone. The folio chart sets for areas like Cape Cod (Chart 13229) are gone. And the charts created by NCC don't offer little "inset" charts like Chart 13238 for Eastern Martha's Vineyard.

The companies that have printed charts are coping as best they can to find ways to deliver products which are useful and safe for navigation. This is a work in progress, so stay tuned.




